Welcome and Agenda Review

Cait McCusker, DSL provided an overview of the agenda and expectations for this meeting. Vicki Walker, Director, DSL welcomed the new advisory group and provided an overview of scope of purpose.

Policy Update and scope of the ADV Workgroup

(Meeting recording, see 13:28 minute mark.)
Jacob Taylor, DSL provided a policy overview on:

HB 2914 Establishes the Abandoned and Derelict Vessels Program

- HB 5029 Allocated \$18.76 million from the Monsanto settlement for deposit into the Abandoned and Derelict Vessels Fund. Was effective 7/1/2023 and some funds have already been expended for ADV removal.
- Community Engagement Have held approximately 40 listening sessions. Positive feedback from community members, stakeholders, and agency partners.

ADV Workgroup Roles and Responsibilities

Cait McCusker, DSL provided:

- Overview of upcoming ADV Workgroup schedule and staff deliverables due to the Legislature in February 2024; provide recommendations that may include Legislative Concepts and Budget items to the State Land Board in April 2024; continue outreach and engagement with the community as well as work with stakeholders on policy and funding requests for the 2025 Legislative session.
- Review of action items that the DSL staff are currently on and future work.
- Recruiting a Waterways Stewardship Manager and an Outreach and Compliance Coordinator.
- Explanation of Workgroup Member's roles and responsibilities.
- Overview of DSL's responsibilities and role.
- All meeting documents (agenda, summary notes, etc.) as well as the recording of this meeting are all subject to public meetings rules.
- In early 2024 will open a public comment period.

Workgroup Introductions

Each member provided their name, title, affiliation, and how their work intersects with abandoned and derelict vessels.

ADV Impacts and history in Oregon

(Meeting recording, see 57:44-minute mark.) Jacob Taylor, DSL gave an overview of:

- Commercial and recreational vessels. Fewer commercial ADVs; however, commercial ADVs have
 a higher impact on the environment due to the amount of asbestos, fuel, other hazardous
 waste, their size, and many other factors. Provided an overview of other aspects of the
 presence and removal of commercial ADVs. Recreational ADVs are much more prevalent than
 commercial ADVs. People living on them complicates removal efforts. These vessels also
- Both types of ADVs have little or no recycling value and neither is subject to State insurance requirements.

commonly contain household waste as well as hazardous waste.

- ADVs pollute rivers and oceans which has negative effects on animals and people as well as negative impacts on recreational opportunities.
- Overview of how ADVs have taken funds out of the Common School Fund. Background on Administrative Rules and DSL ADV activities.
- Explanation of collaboration between State, Federal and local governments to combat ADV problems. Engagement with communities is very important.
- Examples and additional information regarding the history of the following ADVs: New Carissa, Goble (12 vessels), Tourist 2, Alert, Sakarissa, and Tiffany.

ADV Workgroup Shared Outcomes

(Meeting recording, see 1:18:43 minute mark.)

ADV Workgroup members shared their hoped for outcomes. Some of those included:

- It's important to hold people accountable and work on prevention. Need to place financial and cleanup responsibilities on the owners.
- Provide community members with a broader understanding of the dangers of moving an ADV to a marina as well as improve overall understanding of the ADV removal process.
- Having a program in place to report ADVs and reassurance that the State has the resources and processes
- On the recreational side, people have become hesitant to use docks in the Portland area. That has to change.
- A universal dashboard to share information to track and report on vessels that would allow easy
 access to understand where other agencies have had interactions with vessels.
- Identifying where one agency's authority starts and ends will help identify gaps so that we have a clear understanding of the next steps.
- Prevention is a strong element of the ADV issue.
- One of the biggest issues is securing sustainable funding for the ADV Program.
- Go to the legislature to pass more laws to support the program.
- Program needs to be flexible; it will not be perfect in the beginning, needs to evolve to suit Oregon's needs.
- Determine how houseboats may be addressed in an ADV program.
