Oregon's COVID-19 Community Levels

The CDC's COVID-19 Community Levels is a tool you can use to help you make decisions about masking and other prevention measures.

You should wear a mask if you have symptoms of COVID-19, a positive COVID-19 test or are exposed to someone with COVID-19.

Health Talking Points: Is Oregon Prepared for a Respiratory Illness Surge?

Data shows the convergence of multiple respiratory illnesses as colder weather approaches, including RSV (Respiratory syncytial virus), Covid-19, and influenza. Since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the flu seasons have been relatively nonexistent, the virus has not been given a chance to spread due to social distancing and mask mandates. Predictions for this **year’s flu season**, based off data from the southern hemisphere, anticipate a renewed resurgence of influenza. **RSV cases** have also been rising nationwide, a trend which Oregon is following.

While RSV typically presents mild symptoms, if paired with the flu or Covid-19 it could lead to more severe illness. In the case of serious illness and hospitalization occurring due to these illnesses, Oregon hospitals are preparing for an uptick in patients. The convergence of these three infections would add stress to an already strained healthcare system still recovering from the ramifications of the Covid-19 pandemic. In order to mitigate the effects these three illnesses would have on the state, “hospitals continue to communicate and coordinate for bed capacity in Oregon,” says OHA Operations Chief Dewayne Hatcher. The six **Regional Resource Hospitals**, which include OHSU, Salem Health, PeaceHealth Riverbend Sacred Heart, Asante Rogue Regional, St. Charles, and Grande

Ronde Hospital, work with local hospitals to maximize patient access to hospital beds, which began as a result of Covid-19 pandemic.

Retaining staffing and protecting the health of healthcare workers is also crucial to the function of hospitals while Oregon confronts a surge in respiratory illnesses this winter. While there is no vaccination to protect against RSV, the OHA Immunizations Program stresses the importance of **getting vaccinated against the flu** and Covid-19 this season to help protect against serious illness. “**Per CDC**, the vaccination of health care workers is crucial; vaccination of health care professionals has been associated with reduced work absenteeism and fewer deaths among nursing home patients.”

Cedar Creek Shelters SERV-OR Deployment



A lightning strike started the Cedar Creek fire on September 6, prompting evacuations in the community of Oakridge. With concerns for sheltered populations, including those with complex medical needs, Lane County emergency managers placed a request for assistance for SERV-OR volunteers to mobilize and embed with Health Services personnel at the American Red Cross Shelter in Eugene. This devastating emergency resulted in the fastest wildfire mobilization in SERV-OR history with boots hitting the ground in under 9 hours of receiving the request. Over the course of five days, twenty

SERV-OR volunteers contributed approximately 283.5 hours of service to the communities and individuals affected by this fire.

Continuous coverage by volunteers who worked 12-hour rotating shifts, including overnights, enabled the shelter to remain a safe place for community members forced to evacuate.

We want to thank all of the State Managed Volunteer Pool members who deployed to support the communities that took shelter that week! Your professionalism, compassion, flexibility and readiness to respond is exactly why SERV-OR is the well-respected program that we are. Now that fire season has been nearly eclipsed by fall and winter weather patterns, we stand prepared for what winter has in store.

Cannon Beach MRC Receives \$50,000 NACCHO Grant

Cannon Beach (CB) is a small coastal city in Oregon with a population of 1,547 people. The town is busy during the tourist season with around 75,000 visitors each year. Cannon Beach does not have a hospital; the only medical support is a local health clinic. In case of a disaster or emergency, the local MRC needs to have the ability to respond. The roads leading to Cannon Beach would likely be unpassable following an Earthquake or Tsunami event. With no road access and no hospital in town, preparedness to respond is a necessity. The CB MRC prepares by conducting regular training for its members, participating in first aid support during local events, collaborating with Citizen Emergency Response Team and Disaster Animal Response Team, as well as participating in local public health emergency support like the recent [COVID –19 vaccination...](#)
